Books for Book Clubs offers these benefits: a club representative can reserve several copies of a single title at one time, months in advance; those copies can be checked out for an extended period of six weeks - two weeks longer than usual; and one book club member can pick up and return all copies of a title at the most convenient participating library. In order to reserve and check out the books, the club representative needs a library card from a local Lynx! Consortium library. The consortium includes the Ada, Boise, Caldwell, Eagle, Garden City, Meridian and Nampa libraries. Due to the extended checkout time, the books may not be renewed; regular overdue fines apply after the six-week period.

The project, which also includes Robert Pinsky, Ted Kooser, Philip Levine, and Yusef Komunyakaa, will consist of more than 100 American poets reading their own work. The archive was started in 2005 by Andrew Motion, the British poet laureate, and the recording producer Richard Carrington."

Keith Lee Morris will read **November 11** at Bookpeople! Morris will be in the shop from 1-3p.m. to read and discuss his new novel, **The Dart League King**. In this absorbing and intelligent novel, Morris follows five characters through a handful of hours culminating in a dart contest on a Thursday night in Garnet Lake, Idaho: Russell Harmon, who lives for the dart league and his cocaine habit; teammate Tristan Mackey, who is haunted by having not prevented the drowning of a classmate; Kelly Ashton, who wants desperately for someone to rescue her and her young daughter from this small town; Russell's dart rival Brice Habersham, a DEA agent posing as the owner of a gas station; and drug dealer Vince Thompson, who, tonight, is carrying a 9mm Beretta to his meeting with Russell. As each chapter shifts from one voice to the next, Morris cranks up the tension so that by the time the dart match arrives, the book is impossible to put down. Morris explores how even the most banal choices we make- to get in the car or not?- can have a life-altering impact.

On March 25, 2009, author B.H. Fairchild will be doing a reading as part of the Distinguished Visiting Writers program at the University of Idaho. He is a multiple-award winner, including the William Carlos Williams Award and California Book Award, for his books *The Arrival of the Future*, *Local Knowledge*, and *The Art of the Lathe*.
