IDAHO CENTER FOR THE BOOK TO TOUR 'BOOKER'S DOZEN' BIENNIAL EXHIBITION THROUGHOUT IDAHO -The Idaho Center for the Book, housed at Boise State University, is presenting its biennial "Booker's Dozen" exhibition on the first floor of the **Liberal Arts Building during the month of January**. The exhibition will then be displayed in libraries throughout the state.

"Booker's Dozen" is a juried exhibition featuring books that have been designed, written, illustrated and bound by Idahoans. The books were selected by Idaho artists, bookmakers, gallery owners, writers and publishers. A catalog of the exhibition will be available with 3-D glasses from the exhibition sites or from the Idaho Center for the Book office on the Boise State campus.

IDAHO Magazine's 2008 Fiction Writing Contest is their annual fiction contest which deadlines January 31, 2008. Go to www.idahomagazine.com and scroll down to the "Call for entries!" Teachers please call regarding class projects. Cash prizes. From Kitty Fleishman, the publisher, "We have five or six judges each year. Each story is given a 1-100 score by each judge, and winners are determined by having the highest cumulative scores. Something that is always very interesting to me is that judges always think the other judges viewed the stories pretty much as they did, but nothing could be further from the truth. We've had the same story get a zero from one judge and 100s from others. There

are not many contests where stories are judged by so many different judges, and while we won't tell you which judge gave what score, if anyone is curious, we'd be happy to let you know what each judge gave your story. Only ONCE out of the 700 or so stories we've judged over the years has there been a unanimous winner. She was a very young girl who won the youth division when she was 17, and won the adult division when she was 18. It's on our website with the fiction stories, and it's called "The Boyfriend Test." The male judges loved it, the female judges loved it, and, with judges from 18-79, *EVERYONE* loved it. Write on!"
